municipal pool, the splash pad on the Burroughs Creek Trail and the public library are all close by, and provide relief from the heat.

If you are feeling more adventurous, the whole city can be your playground now, with free city bus fares throughout 2023. Speaking of buses, Adam Weigel from Lawrence Transit will be at our July ELNA meeting to speak about bus route changes that will be happening starting in August. Also at the July meeting, we anticipate that the City Planning staff will be there to provide information about the updated East Lawrence Neighborhood Plan that is being drafted. At June's meeting, we will hear from Andy Ensz, City Engineering Program Manager, about a major water line replacement project that will be taking place along New Jersey Street. All ELNA meetings are held in hybrid fashion, in person at the Amtrak Depot and online via Zoom.

June 1 marked the filing deadline for City Commission and USD 497 School Board. There will be primary elections on August 1. Voter registration deadline for the Primary is July 11. City Commission plays a key role in neighborhood development and redevelopment policies and decisions, and the School Board makes decisions that affect the future of New York Elementary and Liberty Memorial Central Middle School as neighborhood schools. YOUR VOTE MATTERS MOST IN LOCAL ELECTIONS! ELNA will provide information about upcoming candidate forums via our weekly enews and social media posts.

You may have noticed that there was no East Lawrence News in May. (We take no offense if you did not notice). We typically publish in odd numbered months, but didn't this time. We will have two quarterly newsletters, this one for May, June, July, and another one for August, September, October. In November, we will get back on track with our regular schedule.

Get FREE fresh fruits and veggies with your SNAP Card at the Lawrence Farmers Market!

What is Double Up Food Bucks?

We'll match every \$1 you spend with another \$1 FREE so you can buy more fruits and vegetables, up to \$25/day.

How do I use my SNAP Card at Market?


Come to the Market!

Bring your SNAP EBT card to the Market Info Booth before you shop. The info booth is located in the yellow tent in the middle of the market, by the alley.

Swipe your Card! After you've found the Info Booth, it's time to swipe your card. We'll match the amount you take off your card, up to \$25 per day. For example, if you swiped your card for \$25, you'll receive \$25 in wooden market tokens, and \$25 in Double Up Food Bucks purple tokens for a total of \$50 to spend at Market!

Enjoy the Market! After you receive your tokens, it's time to spend them! The wooden ones are good for all the usual products (all food producets except for hot and ready to eat foods) and the purple ones are good for fresh fruits and vegetables only. Be sure to use the purple ones for produce first!

- \$1 Wooden tokens represent the SNAP money that you take of of your EBT card. The wooden \$1 are good for meat, eggs, baked goods, honey, nuts, jams, jellies, salsa, sauces, fruits, veggies, and seeds and plants for food (tomato plants or bean seeds); in other words they can be used to purchase any food products that are not hot and ready to eat foods or drinks.
- \$1 Purple tokens represent the matching money provided through Double Up Food Bucks. Purple \$1 tokens can ONLY be used to purchase fresh fruits, veggies, cut herbs, and seeds and plants for food. You should try to use your purple tokens for fruits and veggies first, as those are the only things you can buy with them.

City Board Realignment Meetings and Survey

City seeks feedback on proposed boards and commissions realignment

In 2022, the Lawrence City Commission asked for a plan to help better align the City's volunteer boards and commissions to the work of the strategic plan.

Formed in December 2022, the Boards and Commissions Structure Committee has been charged with developing recommendations that limit the number of boards to no more than 10 (not inclusive of those boards required by statute or state law).

Over the course of the last five months, the committee has engaged stakeholders while carefully reviewing and discussing the City's strategic plan and the current scope and charge of all boards and commissions. As a result of this work, each relevant board and commission has been sorted into the outcome or commitment area to which it is most closely aligns.

The Board and Commissions Structure Committee is now seeking feedback on the draft proposal for board and commission realignment via a digital questionnaire and two public meetings. You can learn more about the proposal and engagement opportunities on the City's website.

Given the possibility that boards and commissions sorted into a particular outcome or commitment area might be combined as part of this process, the Committee is eager to hear from the community regarding the proposed structure.

Ready for Good

We've got a new neighbor on Connecticut St! As you've probably noticed, the Lawrence Habitat ReStore moved last fall out of their location at 708 Connecticut. They're now located at 2108 W 27th St Suite C. In their place, Ready for Good has moved from North Lawrence and set up shop.

In early March, we sat down with Addison Shockley, President and CEO of Ready for Good, to ask a few questions.

.

First of all, what is Ready for Good? What kind of shop is it?

Ready for Good sells household goods largely purchased from retail overstock outlets like Overstock.com. Liquidated furnishing items are donated by and purchased in lot from retailers and some by individuals. We have indoor and outdoor furniture – dining room, living room, garage, bedroom, sinks, fans, light fixtures, small appliances like toasters, instapots, air fryers and more! Currently, we price our stock at 50-75% of retail price.

Store Hours?

Regular business hours are Tuesday-Friday 10-6pm, Saturday 9-6pm, and Sunday 1pm-4pm. But you can shop any time on our website https://shopreadyforgood.com/. That's updated every day. We get new items by the truckload every two weeks, but put new stuff on the floor each day as well. You want to be sure to follow us on social media – facebook primarily. We frequently have sales and special promotions. In the not so distant future, we'd like to start an online bids segment of our website. Stay tuned for that.

Tell me more about the mission of Ready for Good. You're not just a retail store, but a social service agency also?

Ready for Good hires at-risk youth in foster care, homeless youth, and youth involved in the juvenile justice system. So, at any one time, we've hired 8-10 young people. We refer to our young employees as "transition age youth". It's a technical term without stigma, referring to young people making the difficult transition to adulthood. We definitely refer to them as youth, not kids. They appreciate that.

How do you select these young people?

We get referrals from social workers, case workers, foster care workers, counselors, groups like van go, probation officers, a variety of social service groups. Most of the youth live with foster families or in group home settings.

Do the youth get paid for their work?

They get \$8 an hour to start, and can earn raises, promotions with time.

What kind of work do the young people do?

First, the youth spend time learning how to do inventory, pricing, merchandising, customer service, cash register, cleaning, etc. We try to show them how to see what needs to be done, like initiative. Then they spend time in the backroom working – organizing, building and fixing, troubleshooting, salvage, parts, repainting/ refinishing donated furniture, etc.

We also have weekly professional skills, life skills, and job skills workshops, to mentor the youth as they grow into adulthood. Most of the youth stay just 10 weeks before they're considered "job ready." As in, they have the skills to go on to another job. Other young people stay longer and become project leaders.

Do you accept volunteers?

Yes! Let's chat. Want to share your furniture refinishing skills?

Do you accept Donations?

Yes! There's a link on the website. Send us a photo and description, and we'll return contact if we think we can sell it. You can also just stop in during business hours with a picture or two and ask about it in person. We have to be selective, because large items are difficult to move and store. But sometimes if the item is great, we can make something happen. Someday we'll have a van!

Only that we'd like to be a part of the community. We dream of becoming a family community center, indoor play place, a place to stop in your day. And we'd like you to know that our sales cover our overhead costs like rent and wages so we make the mission happen.

Summer Time, Pool Time!

The splash pad is OPEN and located near 15th Street and Haskell Avenue, along Burroughs Creek Trail. The splash pad is free and open to the public from 9 a.m. - 8:30 p.m.

The Outdoor Aquatic Center, 727 Kentucky St., and the South Park Wading Pool, 1141 Massachusetts St., will open Monday, June 5, for the summer season.

The Outdoor Aquatic Center's hours are as follows:

- Public Swimming open from Monday, June 5 Sunday, Aug. 13 Monday-Friday from 1-7:30 p.m. - recreational swim will be available with lap lanes Saturday and Sunday from 1-6 p.m. – recreational swim will be available with lap lanes
- Beginning Monday, June 19, additional lap swimming/water walking hours will be available Monday -Friday from 10 a.m. - 12:45 p.m.

The South Park Wading Pool hours are as follows:

- Open from Monday, June 5 Saturday, July 29 Monday-Friday from 1-7 p.m., except for Tuesday, July 4, when it will be closed Saturday from 1-6 p.m. Sunday: Closed
- The facility can be rented Monday-Friday from 11 a.m. – 1 p.m. in hour-long blocks. You can reserve

the facility online. More information is online at: lawrenceks.org/lprd/aquatics/spwp.

The Indoor Aquatic Center, 4706 Overland Drive, will also switch to its summer hours on Monday, June 5:

- Lap Swimming Monday-Thursday from 6:30 a.m. - 12:45 p.m. and 4-7:30 p.m. Friday from 6:30 a.m. – 12:45 p.m. Saturday from 9 a.m. - 1 p.m.Sunday: Closed
- Warm Water Workouts Monday–Friday from 10:45 a.m. – 12:45 p.m.

Daily admission at the Indoor Aquatic Center and Outdoor Aquatic Center will be:

- \$6 for youth ages three to 17 and senior adults 60 years old and older
- \$7 for adults 18 years old to 59 years old
