From the President

Summer is in full swing in East Lawrence, and some things are as predictable as the heat. Easy prediction: Barry is going to make sure that the East Lawrence newsletter has all the information you need to be prepared to vote in the August Primary election. Check out the article inside this newsletter for all of the details, including important information about

changes in polling location if you live south of Eleventh Street. ELNA permits candidates for public office to purchase ads in this newsletter. Important reminder: Ads or no ads, ELNA does not ever endorse or oppose any candidate for public office. We encourage you to study the issues and the candidates, and encourage you to vote for the candidates you believe would best serve the interests of your family, neighborhood, community and world. The Lawrence Public Library has non-partisan information to help you decide, including links to candidate forums. Check out <https://lplks.org/elections-and-voting/>.

Another easy prediction: As a neighborhood with a lot of historic buildings and infrastructure, proposed local policy changes and implementation will have an outsized influence in East Lawrence. At the present time, there are two pending applications for demolition permits that could change the face of the 1100 block of New Jersey Street. After discussions languished for a decade, the City is now fast tracking a new policy that could result in the eventual elimination of brick sidewalks east of Rhode Island Street. The proposed policy will be reviewed by the Historic Resources Commission at its meeting on July 18 and later by the Multi-Modal Transportation Committee and City Commission. Public comments will be accepted. <https://lawrenceks.org/community-engagement/brick>. The City is currently considering changes to the Land Development Code that would permit and encourage higher density and the elimination or reduction of off street parking requirements. More demolitions and higher property taxes could be a possible result. <https://lawrenceks.org/community-engagement/land-dev-code-update>. In addition to these matters, the Parks and Rec Comprehensive Plan will influence what resources do or don't go into Hobbs Park, and decisions are in the works that will decide if a new Downtown home for Lawrence Transit is really in downtown, or in East Lawrence at the Amtrak station. ELNA is actively monitoring all of these discussions, and several more, and participating in many of them. But YOUR voice is the one that matters more to the decision makers. An article inside this newsletter shows you how to find the most up to date information from inside City sources, so you are not caught snoozing while important decisions are being made that affect you. Your involvement matters! Let the decision makers know what you think!

With all of the conflict and uncertainty in the world, the potential for big changes at the national and state levels and right here on our own streets, and our own personal struggles, whatever they are, sometimes you just gotta chill! What could be better than a visit to our neighborhood Splash Pad on a hot day? Perhaps a short walk to a local eatery, brewery, or coffee place. Perhaps a Wednesday evening City Band concert in South Park. Perhaps Sunday night Kaw Valley Kickball at Hobbs Park. ELNA is there almost every week, grilling burgers and purveying bottles of cold water to the kickball players and fans. Drop by and say hello!

ELNA tries to keep you informed about the goings on at City Hall that affect the East Lawrence neighborhood and the lives of our residents. Since we can publish our paper newsletter only 5-6 times a year, it is impossible to provide timely information about fast moving issues of neighborhood concern. Voter Information for Upcoming Primary Election

Voters should prepare to vote in July / August in the upcoming Primary Election. As always, YOUR VOTE MATTERS!

BIG CHANGES SOUTH OF ELEVENTH STREET

There are some big changes in the Primary Election if you live south of Eleventh Street. The area between Fourteenth and Fifteenth Street, east of Liberty Memorial Central Middle School is no longer in Precinct 33 with the Barker Neighborhood, and residents will no longer vote at the Vintage Church. That area is now part of Precinct 40, with the rest of East Lawrence south of Eleventh Street. Precinct 40's normal voting place, Trinity Lutheran Church, is changing for the Primary Election due to renovations to the church this summer. Just for the Primary Election, voters living in the area south of Eleventh Street and north of Fifteenth Street will vote at Plymouth Congregational Church at 925 Vermont Street. The voting location will return to Trinity Lutheran Church on Thirteenth Street for the General Election.

THE PURPOSE OF A PRIMARY

The Primary Election is held for the purpose of selecting the candidates who will be on the ballot for Democratic and Republican parties in the General Election in October / November. The other official parties select their candidates through a different process. If you are unaffiliated with any party, you may declare an affiliation and vote in the Primary election. If you are already affiliated, you may not switch parties before the primary, as the deadline has already passed. If you are a registered Democrat, this election is particularly important. There are several offices in Douglas County for which no Republican candidate has filed, which means that the winner of the Democratic Primary will be the only candidate on the ballot for the General Election in November. In essence, you will be choosing the eventual office holder in the Primary.

MAKE SURE YOU ARE REGISTERED TO VOTE!

If you need to register, or update your registration information, you will need proper identification. For more information, use this link: <https://www.dgcoks.gov/county-clerk/voting-and-elections/register-to-vote>, or visit the Douglas County Election office, 23rd and Louisiana at the Malls Shopping Center, weekdays 8 to 5. The League of Women Voters also has an information booth on Saturdays at the Farmers' Market.

DATES AND INFORMATION YOU NEED TO KNOW:

July 16: Voter Registration Closes. Please don't wait until the last day!!

July 17: Advance Voting begins and continues in person at Douglas County Elections Office (23rd and Louisiana) at the Malls Shopping Center Weekdays 8 to 5. You may also vote by mail or secure drop box, at the Courthouse at 11th & Mass., the Elections Office at 23rd & Louisiana or at Baldwin City Hall.

October 30: Deadline to request an advance ballot to be mailed to you. Do not wait til this last day!

August 3: Saturday Advance Voting 9am to 1pm. Lecompton Community Building, Eudora City Hall, Baldwin City Hall, County Clerk Elections Office (23rd and Louisiana) at the Malls Shopping Center.

August 5: Advance Voting on Monday Closes at Noon

August 6: ELECTION DAY - every registered Democratic or Republican voter may participate! Polls are open 7 to 7.

WHAT'S ON THE BALLOT:

Congress First District: (Eric Bloom, Tracey Mann, Republicans. Democrat uncontested).

Kansas Senate Second District: (Marci Francisco, Christina Haswood, Democrats. Republican uncontested).

Kansas House Forty Sixth District: (Logan Ginavan, Brittany Kathleen Hall, Brooklynne Mosley, Democrats. No Republican filed).

Douglas County District Attorney (Tonda Hill, Dakota Loomis, Suzanne Valdez, Democrats. Republican uncontested).

Douglas County Commission Second District (Lisa Larsen, Shannon Reid, Democrats. No Republican Filed.)

Precinct 39 Committeeman and Committeewoman (Democrats uncontested and No Republicans filed).

Precinct 40 Committeeman and Committeewoman (Democratic uncontested, No Republicans filed. Neither party has a candidate filed for Committeewoman).

Interested individuals may run write-in campaigns for precinct Committeeman or Committeewoman. It requires a minimum of five votes to win the position with write-in votes.

THREE WAYS TO VOTE:

If you are registered and eligible to participate in the Primary Election, you may vote in advance by mail- in ballot, or by secure drop box. You may also advance vote in person at the Douglas County Election Office at 23rd and Louisiana (Malls Shopping Center).

To request a ballot to be mailed to you, you must fill out the Application for Advance Voting by Mail form. It's best to print it and sign it, as digital signatures are not accepted, and bring it to the County Clerk's office, mail it in, or fax it. You can find that form with instructions here: <https://www.dgcoks.gov/county-clerk/voting-and-elections/advance-voting#Link-To-Advance-Voting-by-Mail>.

If you enjoy the thrill of voting in person on Election Day, you can cast your ballot at your precinct polling location. East Lawrence, North of Eleventh Street is in Precinct 39. If you live east of Mass and north of Eleventh, you'll vote at the Cider Gallery 810 Pennsylvania St. The southern portion of East Lawrence, south of Eleventh and north of Fifteenth, between Mass and the Burroughs Creek Trail is Precinct 40 and normally votes at Trinity Lutheran Church at 1245 New Hampshire, but will vote at Plymouth Congregational Church, 925 Vermont, for the Primary. Polls are open 7am to 7pm.

If you need help getting to your polling place, please email Lane at eastlawrence@yahoo.com and we'll find you a ride! Please don't wait until the last minute!

Are you interested in volunteering to serve on the ELNA Board? Are there issues in the neighborhood you'd like to see addressed? As always, only in-neighborhood individual (not business or nonprofit or out-of-neighborhood associate) members are eligible to vote for the ELNA board. All Board members must be voting eligible. Officers of the Board (President, Vice President, and Secretary) must have been board members for at least ninety days.

Art and Nature Workshops

Sponsored by ELNA at Prairie Park Nature Center

Sponsored by ELNA, neighborhood resident Suzan Hampton recently won a Douglas County Heritage Conservation Council grant to produce a series of artist workshops with nature themes in conjunction with Prairie Park Nature Center's 25th anniversary celebration this fall.

"Since I'm an East Lawrencean, I asked if ELNA would sponsor my grant application due to the long-standing environmentalism and artistic strength of our neighborhood. I'm happy they said yes, and even happier that we won the grant!"

The four workshops, each taught by a local artist, are designed to bring people closer to nature by seeing and creatively interpreting the details in a new way. The artist workshops include Caryn Mirriam-Goldberg guiding students to write poetry inspired by nature, on August 10th. Karl Ramberg teaching stonecarving using native limestone on August 24th. Terri Harper helping students create nature sketchbook journals on August 31st. And Mona Cliff teaching the art of fabric cyanotypes using prairie plants on September 7th. Suzan and Mona will then create a 65' string of prayer flags using the cyanotypes to be strung high between two trees in the Nature Center prairie for the 25th anniversary celebration.

The workshops will be held in the new Prairie Pavilion outdoor classroom at the Nature Center and are being offered through the Parks and Rec as part of their regular activities calendar. Each workshop costs \$20 to cover supplies and will be open to participants aged 13+. See the Parks and Rec's activities catalog on their website for details and to sign up!

Construction, 8th St

City contractors have closed 8th St. from Connecticut St. to New Jersey St. beginning Monday, June 10. This clo-

sure will allow crews to install a 24" water transmission main at the intersection of 8th and New York St.

8th St. will be closed to thru traffic between Connecticut St. and New Jersey St. and will be fully closed at New York St.

The City anticipates this closure to end Friday, July 12, pending weather or other delays.

New Hampshire St. to close at 6th St.

Beginning Monday, June 24, City contractors will close New Hampshire St. at 6th St. to begin work on the next phase of the 6th St. – Iowa St. to Mass St. improvements project. New Hampshire St. will remain open from 7th St. at all times to allow local access to City Hall, Riverfront businesses, and the Riverfront Parking Garage.

The City anticipates this project phase to end mid-September, pending weather or other delays.

Downtown Alleyways

The City of Lawrence will begin work on the 2024 Alley Rehabilitation project on Monday, June 17. This project includes work at the following locations and dates, pending weather or other delays:

Site 1 – 900 Block between Massachusetts St. / New Hampshire St. – July to August

Site 5 – 800 Block between New Hampshire St. / Rhode Island St. (mid-section) – July to August

Site 6 – 700 Block between Massachusetts St. / New Hampshire St. – July to August

During construction, traffic impacts will be limited to locations where the contractor is working. Businesses and residents will be notified a minimum of 48 hours in advance of any access restrictions to their property.

The City anticipates this project to end late-August, pending weather or other delays.

15th St

The City anticipates the closure of 15th Street to end June 28, pending weather or other delays.

History Salons at the Cider Gallery

Domer will be presenting about the rich history in Lawrence, many of the topics he will discuss happened in East Lawrence.

Chef Simon Bates and Codi Bates have planned an inspired evening of food, drink, and conversation while raising funds to support the Embattled Lawrence Volume 3: Building The City.

Tickets are \$100 & include hors d'oeuvres and a 3-course dinner with beverage pairings. Each dinner will have a uniquely coursed menu and beverage pairings.

July 10th – The East Bottoms: A Landscape History of Lawrence's Red-Light District

The heyday of the district was from 1890–1920, mostly due to prohibition and the influence of the railroad. Dennis Domer tells the story of Aunt Jane Williams, a colorful



African American woman who came to Lawrence in 1866 with her husband, becoming one of the wealthiest businesswomen in town. Williams provided many Lawrencians a place to relax, excellent food, alcohol, music, and intimate companionship. Domer states, “the East Bottoms was probably the only place in Lawrence that was fully integrated.” Modest homes that served good food during the day became speakeasies and brothels at night. Once a month or so Williams’ businesses would be raided, she would be jailed overnight, fined, shortly thereafter, it would be “business as usual.” Domer states, “Aunt Jane helped pay for city services, including the judicial system!”

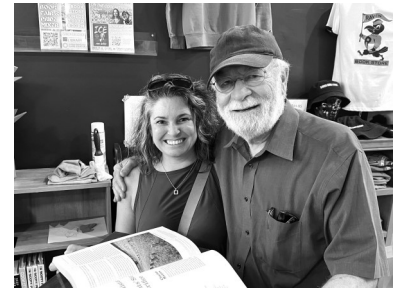
July 17th – AJ Griffin & Mary Carroll: A Pioneer Partnership, 1867-1907

A.J. and Mary Griffin, were one of Lawrence’s most respected early couples. Domer states, “Griffin was a hero in Lawrence, a tremendous businessman and politician, he knew how to make businesses work, he supplied stone, coal, wood, and ice to our growing city, from 1867 to

1907.” Domer will bring them back to life through his stories that researcher Dave Evans has unearthed.

July 24th – Our Sewers, Ourselves: Everyday Life in the Open Sewers of Early Lawrence

Domer takes a deep dive into a topic that has been ignored by local historians, the early ways of dealing with human waste. From 1854 to 1892 Lawrence was very unhygienic. Many people died of Typhoid Fever and Diphtheria. Domer states, “sewers are about water, they need to be separated from the water we drink, our storm drainage system, early on, it all ran together, when it rained heavily, the privies overflowed into the streets and alleys.”



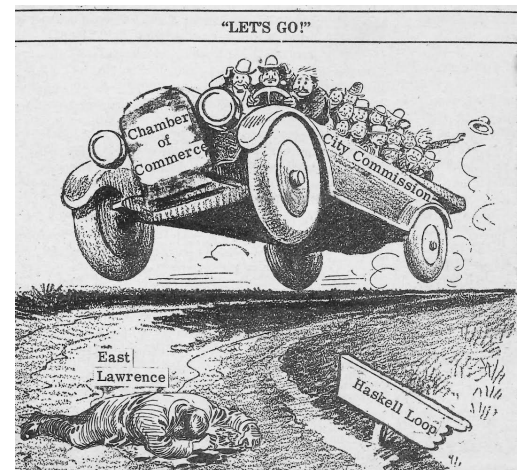
Brena Buchanan and Dennis Domer, taken at the Raven when the 1,500 copies of the EL Vol. 2 arrived on June 21!

In 1892 the city installed the first underground sewer line at 9th and Massachusetts Street.

As recently as 1956 the city was discharging untreated waste into the Kaw River.

July 31st – Not in My Backyard: 50 Years of Defending East Lawrence

This presentation will address the more recent history of East Lawrence, telling the story of how residents have rallied to oppose the alteration and or destruction of their neighborhood. Successfully opposing such “improvements” as the Haskell Loop in the 1970s and the Eastern Parkway Road in the during the late 1980s -1990s s which would have divided and forever changed the neighborhood. Domer will tell stories of how people formed a grassroots neighborhood association that created a structure and forum for residents to advocate for themselves, negotiating with developers such as the Marriott Hotel, and opposing the HUB with the goal of keeping their neighborhood and quality of life intact.
