

ELNA plans to begin in-person meetings again this summer. We hope to hold our meetings in a hybrid fashion, with in-person and online options to participate. Mark May 26<sup>th</sup> on your calendar. This will be a very important date for planning East Lawrence's future. The Lawrence / Douglas County Planning Department is seeking the involvement of East Lawrence neighbors in developing a revised East Lawrence Neighborhood Plan. If you really care about the future of our neighborhood, you will not want to leave it to others to make these important decisions without you! See the article inside this newsletter for more information.

Perhaps the biggest news for East Lawrence in a long time is that New York Elementary School will remain open, as the neighborhood school for the East Lawrence and Brook Creek neighborhoods, for the foreseeable future! USD 497 approved a plan to convert New York Elementary to a public Montessori school. The school would serve families within the New York boundaries first, and then would be open to transfers by students from other neighborhoods, subject to space availability.

Last week, I was looking through some old East Lawrence newsletters from 1983. That kind of thing happens when one lives in a big old house with lots of room for file cabinets full of "stuff". There was an item that New York's enrollment had "increased" to 138 students. Then, as now, our school was threatened with closure. This year, the enrollment was some 50 students more than in 1983. As the Montessori transition goes forward, there is every reason to believe our school enrollment will be close to full capacity, and just maybe, finally be safe!

Make no mistake: because we've had an active neighborhood association over the last 45 years, there is a New York School today, there is a well-preserved historic streetscape, there is a vibrant culture and a strong sense of community in our part of town. If you value what we do, please support ELNA with your participation, your memberships, your donations. Each newsletter costs nearly \$1000 to print and distribute. ## East Lawrence Plan Revisions Begin Soon - First Meeting is May 26th

East Lawrence will soon be engaged in a process to update our East Lawrence Neighborhood Plan documents. The Lawrence / Douglas County Planning Department has assigned staff to begin a collaborative process to revise the planning documents that inform land use and development in our neighborhood. Neighborhood residents and stakeholders will be invited to participate in the process over the course of the coming months, and provided the opportunity to attend meetings and provide input. The first public meeting will be held at New York Elementary on Thursday, May 26, 2022, at 6:30 pm.

According to the Planning Department, "This meeting is all about hearing from the neighborhood. We want to know what the neighborhood wants to see in the plan and even how it should be designed. We want to know the best way to stay in contact with people in the neighborhood and if different types of interaction work better than others. There will be a very brief presentation on what a neighborhood plan is, but the bulk of the meeting will be listening to neighbors."

Although the process has not yet begun, ELNA anticipates that the neighborhood association will advocate for the inclusion of policies that promote: preservation and enhancement of historic resources including buildings and streetscape, cultural diversity, affordable housing, public art and music, continued viability of New York Elementary and Liberty Memorial Central Middle schools, environmental and economic sustainability, walkability, and other attributes that make East Lawrence the special place that it is. When a draft plan is completed, it will be submitted for approval by the Planning Commission and City Commission. Watch your mailbox, e-mail, social media, future editions of this newsletter and other media for information about how to be involved. ELNA encourages everyone to

### USD 497 to Convert New York Elementary to Montessori

In late April, the USD 497 Board of Education voted 4-3 to convert New York Elementary School from a traditional learning model to a public Montessori school. The Board members voting against the change did not disagree with the Montessori concept for New York School, but did not agree with some of the details as proposed by the district administration.

Under the approved plan:

New York would remain as the neighborhood public school for East Lawrence and Brook Creek.

The conversion to Montessori would begin with Kindergarten and a limited number of pre-school students. Older grades would have traditional education and would be added to the Montessori program over time, as the younger students grow into it.

Any family choosing a traditional learning model could seek a transfer to Cordley School. The Montessori program would be open to students from other neighborhoods subject to space availability.

All Montessori classes would be taught by fully trained and certified Montessori teachers, with regular consultation and reviews from KU's Center for Montessori Education.

## **Burroughs Creek Splash Park Update**

City staff met with the contractor of the project, MegaKC, who wasn't satisfied with the concrete work that was recently poured. Unfortunately, it was determined the finish of the concrete and its final grades were not to the standards of the plan. Options were discussed to remedy the situation. The final decision, which will further delay the project, will be to remove and replace the concrete pad at the contractor's expense.

We know the neighborhoods have been anticipating the opening for a long time. We too are excited and want to not only have the facility open for the enjoyment of the neighborhoods but also want to have a quality, safe environment. We hope you understand the decision and will take pride in the facility once it is complete. You'll begin to see concrete being removed and replaced. The delay in opening will depend on the availability of the embedded fixtures, but the contractor is working hard to get the project finished in short order.

## East Lawrence Outsider Art & Culture Tour July 9 from 9am - noon

Former ELNA Board member Suzan Hampton was awarded a Kansas Humanities grant for a neighborhood art and culture project called *Make a Wish: Community Identity and Outsider Art in East Lawrence, Kansas.* ELNA is the community sponsor of the project that consists of oral history interviews about art and culture landmarks in our neighborhood, a walking tour on July 9 from 9am - noon, and a tour transcript and map posted to the ELNA website for future self-guided explorations.

Details are still being planned but the walking tour will start at 9am at the Wishing Bench, make several stops throughout East Lawrence, and will end at 12 noon at the Arts Emergency Art Market next to the Wishing Bench in time for a little shopping. The tour will be led by artist/Kansas Humanities Speaker Erika Nelson from Lucas (of the World's Largest Collection of the World's Smallest Versions of the World's Largest Things fame) with guidance and live participation by East Lawrence artists and neighbors.

## **City Compost Facility**

Location: 1420 E. 11th Street, Lawrence, KS 66044

Hours: Saturdays, March through mid-December / 9 a.m.-2 p.m.

The City of Lawrence offers compost and woodchips to Lawrence residents at the Compost Facility. Compost and woodchips are not intended for commercial applications.

Self-loaded compost and woodchips cost \$10 per truckload. Small quantities of less than or equal to 20 gallon are free.

### 2022 Compost & Woodchip City-Load Events

The City offers City-load days at the Compost Facility once a month (unless noted) during peak season to allow customers to have compost and/or mulch loaded into their trucks or trailers by City staff using loading equipment. All compost facility guidelines are still in effect during City-load events.

**Cost:** Compost and wood chips loaded into trucks or trailers by City staff using loading equipment costs \$10 per scoop. One scoop typically fills a pickup truck bed. There is a limit of three scoops per visit.

### 2022 City-Load Dates (9 a.m.-2 p.m.)

April 2, May 7, June 4, July 2, August 6, September 3, October 1

### **Compost Facility Guidelines**

- Customers must bring their own tools (e.g., shovels, pitchforks) to load and unload.
- Personal motorized loading equipment (e.g., skid steer) is not allowed.
- Gates to the facility will close promptly at 2 p.m. All customers must be out of the facility by closing time.
- Do NOT stop on the railroad tracks while waiting to enter the facility.
- All transactions are CASH ONLY. Please bring exact change.
- Absolutely no bills larger than \$20 will be accepted.

### Yard Waste Drop-Off

- Absolutely no plastic bags
- Brush must not be longer than 4 feet
- Brush must not be more than 8 inches in diameter
- Brush must be loose, no ties of any kind
- Leaves and grass may be loose, or in kraft paper bags only

### Materials Not Accepted

- Lumber
- Pallets
- Sod
- Stones
- Rope
- Fill Dirt
- Food Waste (Including food grown in the garden)
- Metal
- Plastic
- Tree Root Balls

## **Moving Tips from the City of Lawrence**

The month of July is peak season for Lawrence residents to move-in and move-out of apartments, subleases, homes, etc. If you're planning a move here are some steps to make your move easier.

#### STEP 1: SWITCH YOUR UTILITIES

In late July and early August, the city processes 500+ service requests for starts, stops and transfers a day. Fill out an online service request early to get as close to your target moving date as possible.

#### STEP 2: PACK IT UP, PASS IT ON

Pile of trash versus box of donations.

Whether you're moving during the peak move-out season in July and August, or later this year, plan ahead and reduce the amount of items you set at the curb for trash disposal. Keeping in mind reuse, recycling and reduction options through the packing process can keep usable items out of the landfill. Here are a few helpful tips:

REDUCE the amount of waste generated by using reusable or recyclable padding like towels or newspaper to pack your boxes instead of purchasing Styrofoam peanuts or plastic wrap.

DONATE gently used clothing and household goods to local charities or hold a moving sale. Donate non-perishable food to local food banks, pantries and shelters.

RECYCLE obsolete electronic equipment, cardboard boxes, newspaper, plastic bags and all other recyclable materials. Visit www.LawrenceRecycles.org for local options.

PROPERLY DISPOSE of paint, automotive products, household cleaners, pesticides and other potentially hazardous chemicals at the City of Lawrence/Douglas County Household Hazardous Waste Facility. Call (785) 832-3032 to schedule a drop-off appointment.

SCHEDULE A PICK-UP for bulky items no longer usable, such as couches, appliances and automobile tires by filling out the online form available at lawrenceks.org/swm or calling (785) 832-3032.

Please do not take the city trash and recycling carts with you when you move. Carts belong to the address delivered. STEP 3: BE A GOOD NEIGHBOR

Now that you're all settled remember that you're part of our community. Being a good neighbor is courteous. Knowing some basic city ordinances about pets, bicycling, parking, trash, noise and roommates can go a long way to keep neighborhood interactions friendly and positive. Here's a list of some common ordinances that students need to know.

The University of Kansas also has a Good Neighbor program intended to help you understand your rights as a Lawrence resident and access resources to help you live safely and comfortably.

The City of Lawrence cares about our residents and wants to ensure conditions in your home or apartment are safe and habitable. The city has a Rental Licensing and Inspection program that requires all residential rental properties to have a valid rental license and periodic inspections. As a tenant, we want you to know about the licensing program and how this program will affect you. The Rental Licensing and Inspection Program requires interior and exterior inspections of dwelling units to ensure minimum code standards are met to protect the life, health, safety and the general welfare of occupants. ### Lawrence Transit Route Redesign

Transit needs your help determining the final planned route changes for Route Redesign! Route Redesign will occur in two phases, Phase 1 in August 2022 and Phase 2 in January 2023.

- 1. Routes 30, 34, 36, 38, and 42 along with routes 11 & 29, will change in August 2022 to meet the needs of students for a full academic year. Route 41 will be merged with Route 42, and Routes 43 and 44 will have no changes.
- 2. Routes 1, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 9, 10, and 27 will change in January 2023, along with additional slight adjustments to routes 11 & 29, the addition of Route 100, and the addition of Sunday microtransit service. Lawrence Transit is also pursuing a 1-year pilot of fare free transit in 2023.

Each route in the proposed network aims to connect people, jobs, education, grocery, and medical without requiring a transfer. Some highlights for the East Lawrence Neighborhood:

- •Changes to Routes 1 & 7 connect East Lawrence residents directly to grocery on both routes.
- •Changes to Routes 7 & 9 preserve an important connection from the Holcom Park neighborhood to Billy Mills MS and Lawrence HS.
