From the President

November was a banner month for elections in East Lawrence. We had a turnout of over 1500 East Lawrence voters in the 2020 General Election, over 70% of our registered voters. I am proud of our level of civic engagement. But this column is about another election that took place that month.

The East Lawrence Neighborhood Association (ELNA) held its election for Board members and Officers via Zoom in November. Not surprisingly, turnout was much lower for the neighborhood election. I was unanimously elected as ELNA President because I was unsuccessful in convincing the members that they really wanted to vote for somebody else, anybody else. So here I am, writing a President's Column. Special congrats to Boog Highberger, who won reelection as our State Rep in that other election, and then was elected to our ELNA Board.

For those of you who do not know me, I live in the historic Mary and AJ Griffin house at 7th and Connecticut with my wife and two sons, who are students at LMCMS. Luckily, it is a big house, because the four of us have been here together nearly non-stop for most of 2020! A long time East Lawrence resident, I left in 1999 with my dog and cat for what I thought would be a few months. Twenty years later, in the summer of 2019, I moved back with a family. I was ELNA President for three years in the mid-1980's, and here I am doing it again. Our family does a lot of community volunteer work, so we are in familiar territory here. I am grateful to have a dedicated board serving with me, including my capable predecessor Phil Collison, with a very organized and talented neighborhood Coordinator, Lane Eisenbart, who keeps us all on task.

I have four priorities for ELNA in the coming year: 1. ELNA funding. We were dealt a gut punch in 2020 when City Hall reduced our CDBG grant funding. We will explore becoming a 501c3 organization in order to be able to pursue other funding opportunities. 2. Update our official Neighborhood Plan and put long term land use protections in place. Our pleas to update the plan have been ignored by the Planning staff for the last few years. We will persist with the City Manager and City Commission until successful. Our built environment and streetscape are a treasure for all of Lawrence that must be protected. 3. Enhance communications. We do a decent job of communicating to neighborhood residents using various platforms. We need to develop better means for neighborhood residents to communicate with ELNA. You can read about (and respond to) our first communication initiative for 2021 in this newsletter. 4. Better serve the needs of at-risk residents. This goes back to my roots. I got my start at ELNA as a VISTA volunteer in 1980-81. It was my job to visit neighborhood octogenarians in their homes to see what they needed and connect them with community resources. As it turned out, these Seniors themselves were some of our best community resources and neighborhood volunteers. In Covid-world, in-home visits are not feasible, but meeting needs is critical!

We look forward to a brighter 2021. ELNA wants and welcomes your ideas, suggestions, constructive criticism and creative energy. Remember, we are all volunteers, and the only way things get done is by working together in a well-coordinated fashion. We have vacant board positions from time to time, and can always use new volunteers. If you need something, or if you can contribute something, please be in touch!

A Note About Our Possum Lady

Here's what we know about the possum lady:

Our Lady Possum, is definitely a lady, for reasons unexplained. She's handy and unafraid of work, as evidenced by the wrench she carries. Got a clog? Possum Lady can probably fix it. Because she is an East Lawrence resident, we can presume that Our Lady Possum is in fact an Opossum, the only New World marsupial, and a distinct animal from the Australian Possum, which is more closely related to a kangaroo. But the "O" is silent 'round these parts. A rare and beautiful, mostly nocturnal creature who eats ticks and can't get rabies, she can be fiercely protective of her territory and her young. Holiday Tree-Cycling available again

Recycling your holiday tree is a great way to return it to nature. When the holidays are over, you can place live-cut trees at the curb or alley by 6 a.m. on your collection day, and City crews will collect them so they can be given a second life as wildlife habitat.

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KU's Big Event

We have been asked for how long we plan to continue our Wednesday night weekly community meals. The answer is that we anticipate offering this program throughout 2021. We are so grateful to receive a Basic Needs grant from United Way of Douglas County and a grant from Kansas Blue Cross Blue Shield in addition to Lawrence St. Patrick's Day Parade and the countless COMMUNITY donations It takes a lot of resources to offer 250-300 quality, home-cooked (packaged) meals to our community each week - and we are so grateful to have the support of our wonderful community. Since the beginning of the summer, we have increased the number of meals served from 80 to 250! Thank you for coming out for dinner and contributing to this community resource. Look for a press release from the City in January or February of 2021 informing residents of the upcoming implementation and changes to the speed limit on residential streets. The release will feature a map that people can click and view which streets will be changing the speed limit. But we can say right now that East 9th, 11th, and 13th Streets will be included in the speed limit change. Signage will be installed in January and it is expected to take 4-6 weeks to complete signage for the entire city. Also sometime mid-January or February, the City will launch a public awareness campaign with yard signs, magnets, stickers, brochures, etc. So, just a heads up. Stay tuned.

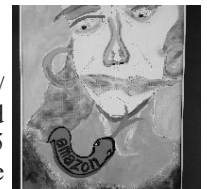

January 3 Construction of Tiny Homes at the Lawrence Community Shelter

Presenter: Dan Rockhill is the principal of the Architecture firm Rockhill and Associates and is the JL Constant Distinguished Professor of Architecture at the University of Kansas School of Architecture, Design, and Planning

Description: Rockhill will provide origin of KU Architecture Program and discuss the necessary planning and development required for the construction of these sustainable homes.

January 10 How (and Why) to Tattoo Greenhouses with Semi-Transparent Solar Panels

Presenter: Rebekah Waller, Ph.D. candidate, University of Arizona, Biosystems Engineering

Description: Greenhouses are increasingly seen as a critical part of resilient food systems. Waller will present photovoltaic "tattoos" as an inexpensive eco-friendly strategy to produce food and renewable energy on the same land footprint.

This discussion will highlight the Partnerships for Food Resource Recovery Project launching in 2021, funded by a recent \$90,000 USDA award to the County to support efforts to reduce and recapture food waste.

January 31 Climate Change and Need for Refrigeration

Presenter: Mark B. Shiflett, Ph.D., P.E., Foundation Distinguished Professor, The University of Kansas, Chemical and Petroleum Engineering
