From the President

Howdy, Neighbors,

Living in Old East Lawrence for 8 years, it certainly seems like we are constantly fighting off other, more influential people and what they think our neighborhood should be. Be-



hind the vague words of "revitalize" and "improve" and "unstable" and "blight" runs a basic undercurrent that there is just something wrong with our neighborhood and that it needs to change.

But people choose to live in our neighborhood for how it is now! Flowing through our neighborhood are the twin philosophies of "live and let live" and "one person's trash is another person's treasure". While "open-minded" is merely a buzzword for some people, it is an actual way of life here, and people really respond to that refreshing change of attitude.

Compost

Compost consists of decayed organic matter and has been proven to be extremely successful as a natural soil amendment. Lawrence Community Compost is made from the yard trimmings and small woody debris collected curbside on Monday mornings, as well as grass clippings, leaves, and woody debris from some commercial lawn care providers.

Woodchips

Mulch is a material used to cover the soil. Most mulches are organic (woodchips, unfinished compost, straw) but

inorganics such as lava rock or limestone can add an appealing, low maintenance touch. Good mulch conserves water by reducing moisture evaporation from the soil.

The woodchips the City sells are made from tree materials brought in from residential and commercial sources. The Forestry Division manages both the influx and distribution of these materials, and may be reached at (785) 832-7979.

De-Clutter and Downsize to Save Yourself Time and Money

For my spring cleaning, I am on a mission to drastically pare down my STUFF. There are such good reasons to do this:

The first issue, of emotional attachment is that I need to remember that even when I get rid of an item, I still have the memory I associate with it. Secondly, I need to remember that even though my grandmothers and other relatives are very important to me, I don't need to keep every single thing they gave me. I have dozens of items from my grandmothers, and I know I can pare it down to just a few.

The second issue, of "I might need it sometime" is tough too. There is no reason to get rid of something that will be useful in the future, but there are some criteria I need to stick to. Questions to consider are: How difficult would it be to get another one? How much money would it cost to get another one if I found I needed it? If I keep it, will I know where it is and remember that I have it? Frequently I find the answers to these questions help me part with items I really don't need.

Tenants to Homeowners Opens Housing Legacy Fund

Tenants to Homeowners, Inc (TTH) is one of 242 members of the National Community Land Trust - a network of nonprofit community housing development organizations dedicated to making homes permanently affordable in communities where there is a wide disparity between income and the cost of housing. In such locations the cost of land is prohibitively expensive. By owning the land and placing it in permanent trust, the land or housing trust is able to significantly reduce the initial housing cost to the potential buyer. The land lease contains a resale provision which ensures that if the house is sold, it goes to another low or moderate income person. This is one of the reasons why it is called a community land trust: you agree to pass on the same benefits that you received upon getting into your house to the next homeowner. Currently there are over five thousand community land trust homes across the country. CLTs nationwide also provide housing through affordable rental properties and housing coops, while developing community facilities, preserving open space and working with other community groups to promote economic opportunities. Additionally, because all land trusts are locally operated, they provide greater local control over land and housing ownership and build leadership among community residents. Two East Lawrence residents currently serve on the TTH board.

In 2005 Tenants to Homeowners converted the first time affordable housing program known as HOOT to the Lawrence Community Housing Trust (LCHT) in order to find a way to transfer the affordable housing subsidy with each resale. The Housing Trust currently has 54 owneroccupied homes and 50 rental units in trust. A number of East Lawrence residences are in trust, including the north end of the 1100 block of Rhode Island, and homes on Delaware, Pennsylvania, New York, New Jersey and Connecticut Sts. Several older homes in disrepair were in danger of becoming slum and blight properties before being rehabilitated and brought into trust through the LCHT program.

Continuing a commitment to permanently affordable housing in Lawrence, TTH established The Tenants to Homeowners Affordable Housing Legacy Fund at the end of 2011. The fund is managed by the Douglas County Community Foundation (DCCF), which oversees a variety of funds for such organizations as the United Way, Meals on Wheels and the Lawrence Public Library. Unrestricted donations can be made online, by mail or in trust. Trust donations can include donations of lots or housing (including the lot). DCCF can be contacted in person or by mail (900 Massachusetts, Suite phone (843 - 8727)406). bv or online (www.dccfoundation.org). If an East Lawrence homeowner were concerned about preserving residential status on their block, it might be possible to put a home in trust with Tenants to Homeowners through the Housing Legacy Fund at DCCF. The lot could become an immediate part of the LCHT, with stipulations in the trust agreement as to how the home in trust would become available for sale through the Lawrence Community Housing Trust. The land under the house would be dedicated to providing a permanent, affordable housing subsidy. TTH would be willing to discuss the process in detail with any interested individual or at an ELNA meeting.

Help Your Neighborhood Schools! Liberty Memorial Central Middle School & New York Elementary

Recycling: Deffenbaugh dumpsters, accepting all types of recyclables except glass and plastic bags, are located at both Central and New York schools. The schools will receive \$25/ton for your donations!

Box Tops for Education: The familiar "Box Tops for Education" labels can be found on many popular grocery items. When you clip them, save them, and bring them to the schools, New York and Central can receive valuable instructional materials of their choice through this program. Drop boxes are located in the front entrances of each school.

Hy-Vee Receipts: Both New York and Central now collect Hy-Vee receipts. This collaboration with Hy-Vee will help the schools to raise funds for field trips and other activities.

Checkers Receipts: Checkers receipts mean materials and equipment for New York Elementary! A drop box for Checkers receipts is located at the front entrance of New York School.

Campbell's Soup Labels: In addition to Hy-Vee and Checkers receipts, New York Elementary also collects the labels of Campbell's soup cans. Can labels can be deposited in the same locations as the receipts.

Ink Cartridges: There is a collection box in the entryway of New York Elementary accepting spent inkjet ink cartridges. The cartridges will be recycled and the return cash will be credited to New York Elementary's general site fund. Office Depot will also accept donations on behalf of New York Elementary.
